Dear Friends,

One of the things that we have been thinking about as we have celebrated 150 years of our church's ministry and mission is the incredible changes there have been in our society and culture in that time. 1863 was a time of great progress at that point in Queen Victoria's reign, but just consider the transformation since then.


The first traffic light came into operation in London in 1868, even though the traffic was mostly horse-drawn, or steam powered. The internal combustion engine was invented in 1876, and people took to the air as well as the road after the first flight by the Wright Brothers in 1903. Supersonic flight was achieved in 1947, and men landed on the moon in 1969 - "one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind."

In 1863 the British ruled the world through its empire, which was one of the 'greatest' empires the world has ever seen. Wars began to change that position with the Boer wars of 1880-81 and 1899-1902, and then the First and Second World Wars of the 20th Century.

In this last century and a half there have been dramatic developments brought about by science, secularisation, and computerisation, resulting in considerable changes in public and private morality. We probably wouldn't want to go as far as the hymn *Abide with me* expresses it: "change and decay in all around I see", but we can see the point made by Henry Lyte, the writer.

Amidst all these changes, the Church, and our church in particular, has needed to adapt and change. We are faced with different challenges in our present situation, as we seek to be God's people in a fast-changing world, in this part of Hove. Even with successful activities and organisations in our church, we need to look to the future rather than living on past glories. So, may the Lord continue to guide and bless us as we build on the 'cornerstone', and on the achievements of the last 150 years of worship and outreach in our community.

Some of you might know that Alex & Louise met in Germany on Operation Mobilisation’s ‘Love Europe’ in August 1989, leading an evangelism team In West Berlin just a few months before the Berlin Wall fell (there’s a whole back story if you’d like to know more)

We kept in touch with several members of the team but mostly with someone who went on to work full time with OM in Pakistan: **Jenny Davies**. Jenny’s work includes teaching the children of the other missionaries who come from all over the world. Her regular newsletters have told us much about the stresses and challenges of living in an Asian culture, the persecution Christians face in a Muslim culture and more positive relationships within the communities she serves in, plus alerting us to urgent prayer requests for peace and stability for an often dangerous country.

Jenny is currently on her furlough (home visit/rest) during which she is visiting supporters and friends in order to tell us about her work and raise funding for supporting their outreach.

Alex & I have invited her to stay with us for a weekend and so she will be joining us at Hounsom with Portslade on Sunday morning 21st July and probably the evening service at Central. We are then planning a curry evening on Monday 22nd July, where Jenny will do a presentation on her role and life in Pakistan and answer any questions you might have

We would like to invite you all and your friends to this event. In order to know what type and how many portions of curry we need to order please sign the list in each of the churches. We hope to hold the event in one of the churches but if not many people sign up it will be at the manse, so please sign up quickly so we can plan appropriately! If you need transportation we can sort that out nearer the time, so don’t let it put you off!

It’s really important to engage with the wider world church and it’s challenges so this is a brilliant opportunity to hear from someone who has a lot of experience of cross cultural evangelism. Please come & support it. We anticipate the curry will cost about £3-£4 per person and ask for a donation towards Jenny’s expenses and ministry on top of that. But please see the posters for more details. We will provide non curry

food for people who don't like it too.

If there is enough interest following this Alex & I can do a presentation on our trip to Pakistan and some of the art and cultural experiences we had there visiting other OM missionary friends at a later date.



CHRISTIAN BOOK CLUB

In June members of the Book Club read “An Alien at St Wilfrid’s” by Adrian Plass, a Christian author, some of whose other books had been read by a few of the group.

The alien in the book appeared as a small “blob-like” friendly character that sat in the pews emanating light. This strange creature was thought, by some, to be an embodiment of the Holy Spirit sent to improve relationships within the church, St Wilfrid’s.

Only four members of the church, one of which was the vicar, were able to see and talk to nNunc, the alien. In so doing, they became more aware of their own faults and of the difficulties of others, thereby transforming their lives for the better.

As usual, there was free and frank discussion, with much laughter and the views varied widely. Some enjoyed the book; others disliked it and some were disappointed – but we *had* all read it.

Certainly the evening was worthwhile, with discussion of some of the core elements of the Christian faith. The story also revealed the need for open-heartedness and empathy in creating an effective church community.

Over coffee an interesting discussion spontaneously sprang up about the value of belonging to the Book Club. It was generally agreed that we had read books we would never have thought of reading, including some from the Bible. Some we had loathed; some we had loved; some, though surprisingly few, most of could not read or finish at all. Even the books we had disliked had widened our horizons and made us think about our attitudes, our beliefs and our faith. Those, who had soldiered on to the end of the most dreary/baffling book just because it was the Book Club choice for the month, felt a real sense of achievement.

And it is not just something which can be measured in terms of books read but also of friendship and a better understanding of each other.

The book for July is “The Lifeboat” by Charlotte Rogan.

We will meet on Monday 29th July at Carol Tyler’s house.

ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATIONS

Over the week of celebrations of our 150 years of worship and outreach, we were particularly blessed by warm and, occasionally, sunny weather, which, although it gave the flower arrangers a headache, added to the festive atmosphere.

At the Service of Celebration on Saturday, 22nd June, we were pleased to welcome the Moderator of the General Assembly of the United Reformed Church, Rev. Dr. Michael Jagessar as our preacher, as well as special guests, such as the Mayor of Brighton & Hove, our local MP, Mike Weatherby, some local clergy and past members and ministers. It was a delight to welcome them all and there were some very noisy and happy re-unions.

During the service the singing was excellent and it was great to have the augmented choir sing the anthem, "Look to the World" by John Rutter. A real treat! Alan Ireland at the organ introduced and concluded the service wonderfully with his choice of voluntaries: "Adagio" from 1st Trio Sonata by JS Bach, "Prière à Notre Dame (From Suite Gothique) by L. Boëllmann and, finally, "Nun Danket alle Gott."

Dr Jagessar in a very impassioned address encouraged us to be the "Living Stones" of the church and community, as described in the second reading, I Peter 2 vv 1-10. "The Living Stone and a Chosen People." It was a very uplifting and encouraging sermon given with enthusiasm and belief.

While it was lovely to have our guests and friends join us, this was about Central in its varied forms over 150 years, so our own members read lessons and gave accounts of Central's roots and unification and our own ministers led us in prayer.

The noise level at the tea afterwards was high on the Richter Scale and there was a great deal of laughter, reminiscing and wonderment as people examined the exhibits of the two churches laid out in the New Hall.

The next day, Sunday 23rd, our morning worship was led, appropriately, by the members of the Sunday Youth Ministry or Sunday Schools as they would have been called 150 years ago. The young people took a mischievous delight in reminding us that 150 years previously it was as a Sunday School that worship was first conducted on our site. So, they were the true heirs of the founders! They took the congregation on a trip down memory lane, not just by narrating the history of the young people

of the congregations but also by singing some of the choruses sung in Sunday Schools. “The wise man built his house upon a rock” and some others elicited nostalgic smiles among the congregation.

Mid-week, the church was full of bustle once more, as furniture was re-manoeuvred and flowers were cut, trimmed, tucked in oases and every possible container, as arrangements were composed around the sanctuary. The Flower Festival preparations were well under way. By that evening, they were complete and the church was transformed.

The theme of each was a Bible story and in attempting to fulfil the brief, the arrangers took inspiration from both Old and New Testaments. The excitement, colour and movement of Pentecost was the largest and blazed colour across the whole of the platform with reds, oranges, yellows glowing and swirling almost the width of the church, up lectern, pedestal and walls. From this spectacle the other arrangements covered a wide gamut of stories and floral fantasy. The amount of thought, creativity, imagination put into each, down to the smallest detail, brought each story to life and gave new insights into the message contained within.

Throughout this Festival period there was a constant coming and going, not only up in the sanctuary but also in the halls where people could enjoy refreshments at the Central Café, or peruse the historical artefacts, pictures and papers or savour something of what our church is about.

There was a steady stream of visitors each day to the Flower Festival and it was always interesting to watch their re-actions to it both as a whole and also to individual arrangements. Some were very moving. Our visitors came not only from our congregation but also from other churches within Hove as well as non-churchgoers and passersby. Few left untouched.

The Anniversary Concert on Saturday evening was a joy. A fuller tribute and review of the talent shared is given on Page 26 .

Our Southern Synod Moderator, Rev Nicola Furley-Smith, helped to round off the week’s celebrations by leading our worship on Sunday 30th’s morning Praise Service. She too based her address on the strengthening of the spiritual and communal life within the church as recorded in Galatians 5 vv 13-18 thus reinforcing her colleague’s challenge of the previous week.

The entire week was rounded off with a church lunch, which was plentiful, delicious and indicative of the blessings God has poured on us

throughout our anniversary celebrations and the previous 150 years. Now we must take up the challenge and responsibilities handed down to us by those good people down the years and by our Moderators as expressed in the words of the final hymn of the Service of Celebration.

***Go forth for God, go to the world in joy,
To serve God's people every day and hour,
And serving Christ, our every gift employ,
Rejoicing in the Holy Spirit's power.***

So many gifts, so much good will and friendship were evident in the amount of work done, time given, helping hands extended over the week by the people of the church from 4 - 90 + years of age that it would be invidious to name names, so I won't. When everyone works together for a common cause wonderful things can happen. Our truly deep thanks to everyone in Central or associated with it; to our friends from neighbouring churches who supported us by giving of their talents and time or by visiting; to our friends who returned and showed they had not forgotten us; to neighbouring businesses who gave their support in various ways, and to God be the Glory for He truly blessed us.

THE ANNIVERSARY CONCERT

Of the many concerts I have attended at Central, this one must rank among the best. Not least because it demonstrated what a loose description “popular classical music” is and what a wide range of styles and types of music it encompasses. The concert was well attended with over eighty people present, many of them not regular members of our church family.

The concert opened with three soprano pieces sung by Rebekah Smith. We have, of course, known her singing for many years and it was a delight to hear how her first year of college training has added to her already considerable talent in the power of her voice, in the way she could hit and retain the highest notes and in her musical expression. Rebekah sang three equally delightful pieces as the penultimate item in the

second half of the concert.

The Sussex Flutes followed, playing classical music in the normally accepted meaning of that term. The fact that only two of their members were able to play on this occasion did not noticeably detract from the performance. In the second half they came on last, playing two lighter pieces that ably demonstrated the skill and virtuosity of each flautist, to close the concert

Steve Hawksley was a new voice to most people present, and his bass baritone singing was appreciated by everyone. He sang four pieces, based by their composers on sources as diverse as Greek poetry and Negro spirituals. Interestingly one of his pieces, “*Orpheus and his lute*”, had the same title as one sung earlier by Rebekah Smith. Although based on the same Greek legend, they were by different composers and very different in content and style. Steve then opened the second half of the

concert with three pieces by twentieth century composers, all based on poems by William Shakespeare.

Alan Ireland, playing with all the skill and talent we know he has, ended the first half on the organ with three whimsical and amusing pieces, the last of which in particular drew appreciative and amused chuckles from the audience. In the second half he played a lovely trio sonata by Bach, his favourite composer. (*“The greatest composer who ever lived” in his unbiased opinion.*)

I cannot end this article without a special word of thanks to Alan Ireland for the time and effort he put in to making the concert such a success. On the evening itself he not only played his own solo pieces on the organ but, on the piano, accompanied virtually every other piece played or sung. Prior to the concert, he persuaded Steve Hawksley to sing, practised his own pieces and spent time rehearsing all the other artistes taking part.

My personal contribution to the concert, if only in a small way, was in producing the programme. My only regret is that I didn't include a line that read, *“Producer & artistic Director (Music) – Alan Ireland”*.
