On 17th October the Company held a special celebratory sausage and chips evening to celebrate the 75th anniversary of Peter Gear's enrolment in the Tenth.

In 1941 an eight years old Peter was enrolled into the Lifeboy section under the leadership of Bert Frampton. In 1945 when he was 12 he joined the Company Section and remained there until he was discharged in 1951 as a Staff–Sergeant. During this time he "wore out" three different Captains: Bob Skinner, Jack Skandon and Harry Stone; although strangely each saw fit to promote Peter through the ranks. After his discharge Peter took battalion exams to become a Warrant Officer and eventually a Lieutenant.

Peter talks fondly of his time in the Company's bagpipe and drum band in which he literally banged the big bass drum and of camps at Glynde. The first one he went to in 1946 cost \pounds 1-2s-6d.



Peter says being in the Boys' Brigade taught him discipline, gave him lifelong good friends, and introduced him to the Christian faith without which he might have ended up on the wrong side of the law instead of becoming a policeman. To the Company's delight we were able to contact many Old Boys who came along with their wives and joined us for our supper. They kept the secret and Peter knew nothing about the surprise that awaited him in the New Hall until he walked through the door. He thought he was just helping escort the Juniors and Anchors to their tables.

The noise was tremendous, the atmosphere great and the look on Peter's face was priceless!

Thank you, Peter, for all the years of service and support you have given to the Tenth.

In November, we marked the beginning of BB Week by holding our Enrolment Service in the sanctuary. Rev. Sue, our Company Chaplain, led the service and we enjoyed the refreshments afterwards, before continuing with our regular programme.

MENS' FELLOWSHIP

Shoreham Fort (Part 2)

As mentioned previously, the Fort was built on orders of Lord Palmerston in 1857, due to a threat of invasion by the French. This never happened. However, the Fort continued to be manned by the First Sussex Artillery Volunteers until it was decommissioned in 1906.

The Fort then took on a new role - it was used in the beginnings of the film industry.

A scenic artist named Francis Lyndhurst, grandfather of the British actor, Nicholas Lyndhurst, (of "Only Fools & Horses" fame) brought film making to the Fort in 1915.

The first picture Francis made "The Showman's Dream" was filmed at the Fort. Had it not been for the first World War, it has been suggested that Shoreham could have been "Hollywood by Sea"

It once again played an important part in our defences during the Second World War. Two switches were installed within the Fort – the harbour entrance was packed with explosives and in the event an invasion took place by the Germans, the first switch would be thrown trapping those inside the harbour. Then the second switch would be thrown. This detonated a pipeline filled with oil, which was laid along the full length of the harbour floor. The resulting explosion would ignite the oil and incinerate the boats and troops above. Fortunately, as in Palmerston's day, it was never used. The harbour was used for the mooring of boats and storing of equipment prior to D Day and the Fort was manned to ensure security of the site.

Following the war the Fort was left to decay for a number of years. Some of its areas and buildings have sadly been demolished but there are plans to rebuild her back to her 1857 glory.

Now the community joins together to give the Fort a future and a band of enthusiastic volunteers, known as "The Friends of Shoreham Fort", has been formed. They hold regular events from volunteer days, military history weekends and an annual Tea Light Remembrance Service. Shoreham Fort is a fun place to be and will continue to thrive and improve. It is open to members of the public all year round. In addition, every fortnight on a Sunday, there are free tours and refreshments when the Friends of Shoreham Fort are on site. *Peter Gear*

CHRISTIAN BOOK CLUB

24th October was GALLIMAUFRY NIGHT at the Book Club and it certainly lived up to its name. In case you are uncertain about the definition of "Gallimaufry", it means, "a miscellaneous collection of oddities."

Each member had been asked to bring along a piece of poetry or prose, which meant something to him/her and our choices were very different and wide-ranging. Hence Peter read a delightful passage from a Miss Read book about a boy making a Robin Christmas card and being worried it was not good enough and whether the recipient would like it. Sentimental but it made everyone smile reminiscently. Clare had a poem, "Explorers", which she had found very useful over the years for Girl Guide devotions, whilst Kim read aloud Psalm 1. Frances had chosen an item from her daily devotions book which made her laugh so much that she was almost incapable of reading it aloud. On a more sombre note, Rosemary chose the lament of the two mothers, Mrs Tancred and Juno Boyle from Sean O'Casey's play "Juno and the Paycock" having been moved by the scenes on TV showing the violence in Syria. "Lest we forget" by Kipling was chosen by Keren as Remembrance Day approached, Chip's choice was Gerard Manley Hopkins' poem "Pied Beauty" but the climax of the evening was Pam Moody presenting us with copies of John Betjeman's "poem", HYMN and insisting we sing it. The tune is that of The Church's one Foundation

> The church's restoration In eighteen -eighty-three Has left for contemplation Not what there used to be..... Sing on, with hymns uproarious, Ye humble and aloof, Look up! And oh how glorious He has restored the roof!

On that note – no more need be said.

A greater change of tone could hardly be anticipated by the challenge presented to us by November's book of the month, "Tiger Mother" by Amy Chua. The book is a memoir of how the author brought up her two daughters, Sophia and Louisa, according to the dictates of being a good Chinese mother. Hence her daughters were never allowed to:

- Go on a play date
- Have a sleepover
- Be in a school play
- Complain about not being in a school play
- Watch TV or play computer games
- Get any grade less than an A
- Not be the No. 1 student in any subject, except gym and drama
- Play any instrument other than piano or violin
- Not play the piano or violin.

We found the regime, which she imposed on her daughters, impossibly restrictive and some even considered it to amount to child abuse. It is not that the group is composed of liberal laid-back parents and we do sometimes feel that, on certain issues, political correctness has ousted common sense but the enforced hours of practising on musical instruments, not of their choice, on top of extra studying to keep ahead of their classmates, seemed to make for a joyless existence, rather than a life, for the daughters. One of the incidents, which really shocked us, was when Amy Chua tore up a card, which her daughter made for her, because it wasn't done to a sufficiently high standard in the mother's eyes. (Such a contrast to the robin card of Miss Read's book.)

We also could not understand the attitude of Ms. Chua's husband to this over-disciplined life style. He seemed to have no input into his daughters' lives at all or was it anything for a quiet life?

We were fortunate to have Kim Wood with us and she was able to give some insight into the mind-set or culture of far- eastern countries and also of her own experiences as a girl in South Korea. Her cry throughout the evening was that we didn't and couldn't understand the cultural thinking of that part of the world. And to be fair we didn't.

During the time we were reading "The Battle Hymn of the Tiger Mother," two articles appeared in "The Times" newspaper, which also gave us some food for thought. The first one was about a "Tiger Headmistress", who had reversed the standards of a poorly performing school in a poor inner city area by imposing strict discipline and standards not only on the children but on the parents. Result: increased achievements in numeracy and literacy and the children liked school! The second was a report on children from a British comprehensive school who went to school in Korea for a week and their reaction to the standards and hours set there. The clearest example was when one boy, who had got 12 straight A*s in his GCEs saw a class of pupils finish an GCE maths paper in 15 minutes which, in Britain, was set to last 1 hour. The down side of the will or expectation to succeed was the high suicide rate among teenage boys who found the pressure too much.

On the other hand, as we started to read the book there was a report of an MP who admitted that his daughter texted her parents from her bedroom to the kitchen where they were, to ask what was for dinner and when it would be ready as she was hungry!!!

The blurb said the book was "hilarious" "humorous and sparky": we found it cold, formidable and absolutely lacking in charm.

By January 23^{rd} , we hope to have read "Nora Webster" by Colm Tobin and will be meeting at Clare Popley's home, at 8.00 pm. Please feel free to join us.
