

Dear Friends,

3 Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us with the fullness of his blessing in Christ. Ephesians 1 v 3

17 Whoever is a believer in Christ is a new creation. The old way of living has disappeared. A new way of living has come into existence. 2 Corinthians 5 v 17.

What wonderful scriptures we can share together. They remind me of that incredulous question that Nicodemus posed to Jesus in John 3; 'How can someone possibly be born', asked Nicodemus, 'when they're old? You're not telling me they can go back a second time into the mother's womb and be born, are you? How can Jesus work in our lives?' We all feel our age and our limitations as we get older, but we need to remind ourselves that God loves us and believes in us; giving us the Holy Spirit to help us, trusts us with the work of building the kingdom of God. I have had conversations with many of you about the desire to see the church growing and developing in response to God's call to us. We are serving God in the church; therefore, we must allow God to shape the future. "How can we do this?"

We must build our personal and church family life on Jesus, supported by the power of the Holy Spirit. We need to put our trust in God's Word and Prayer; tools of communication which support our relationship with God. We all know that all important relationships need to be worked at and cultivated. Just like a plant. If we lavish our attention on our plant, it will grow and flourish. If we don't pay careful attention, it may wither and even die. God is calling us to renew and revitalise our commitment to

this church family. We all need to pay attention to our personal health and well-being. This is the same process for our church family's health and long life. This is an invitation for you to begin that energising process; we all need to rediscover the power God gives us as a faithful church

Please come on this journey, together, we can leave behind all the things that hold us back and take up the energy which will help us be a vibrant community of faith for the future. We can rely on and serve God faithfully, with our heart, soul, mind and strength. It is only when are fully focussed on God that we will be equipped to reach out into the community which God calls us to serve in faith.

Please take opportunities presented during the Autumn to reconnect to God's power and work, through Jesus. Please pray for God's guidance and direction. Who knows where God is leading us?

A TRIBUTE TO PAM MACAULAY

Twenty-three years ago Pam Macaulay started WELCOME BREAK. This was to be a lunch time non-profit making drop-in for anyone in the community.

Pam has run it, organised its helpers and been there nearly every Wednesday ever since.

One thing became slightly different from the original vision: it made a profit, which gave £10,00 to the church and £5,00 to other charites over the 23 years.

Pam's love and friendship has come to mean a huge amount to many lonely people. She knew how they liked their tea, which sandwiches they preferred or if they had their soup in a cup or a dish. She listened to their stories and often was one of the few at their funeral.

This sort of pastoral care is very rare today, so, it was with great sadness that we, and they, learned Pam was retiring.

Pam, we would like to take this opportunity, as a whole church, of thanking you for the last 23 years work.

CHRISTIAN BOOK CLUB

Who would have guessed it! We have reached double figures – age wise, that is. We are ten years old!

Carol Tyler, our wonderful and meticulous records keeper, informed us of this little known fact when she produced a birthday cake at our September meeting. This produced a flood of reminiscence about books we had liked/ loathed/argued over and agreed to disagree about. One of our first books was The Shack, a raved about book in literary reviews and one which haunted us from charity shop book shelves in its dozens for the next two years. We have read books from the Bible, which we otherwise might not have ventured into and which shook up some of our childhood ideas, we have our "collections" of favourite Psalms, poems and Christmas readings and we have expanded our reading to genres which might have seemed daunting. Through it all we have shared ideas, discussed some very deep questions of life and morality and always listened to each other with respect whether we agreed or not. We have, generally, kept to the "rules" of finishing each book, somehow, and of not discussing it until we met on the club night. We have learned from and about each other. And the abiding memories are ones of laughter and friendship.

Our book choice for September was chosen to break us in easily after the summer holidays, prior to which we had rather stretched ourselves in our choices.

"Tears of the Giraffe" by Alexander McCall Smith transported us back to Botswana to the No.1 Ladies' Detective Agency owned and run by Precious Ramotswe, Botswana's only female detective.

If you are a fan of *The Bodyguard*, then this might not be the book for you, in fact its gentle, kind approach even makes *Miss Marple* episodes appear aggressive.

It is not that, in what might appear at first sight to be a backwater in Africa, there are not problems, there are many – even murder. The same questions of morality, a fast changing society, adultery, women's rights, the economy and the care of orphans all appear in this book. But overridingly the tenor of the book is gentleness, kindness, consideration for others. There is a rhythm of Africa and Botswana, in particular, which quietly absorbs the reader. One of the aspects of life, which emerges, is consideration for others which means that life is not always black and white. Is it always wrong to tell a lie, even when the truth would shatter

and destroy several lives? Perhaps a half-truth is better.

Mma Makutsi is intelligent, hard-working, highly qualified – she got 97% in her final exams but because she wears glasses and is not "beautiful" she ends up working as a secretary in Mma Ramotswe's detective agency because the larger firms cannot see beyond her outward appearance. A girl student leaves higher education because of the pressure to sleep with a tutor. A mother wants to know what has happened to her son, who disappeared ten years ago. Two orphans need a family and a home and the wonderful Mr JLB Matekoni finds himself adopting them without telling his fiancée and she absorbs all this and the future, not with anger but with a feeling that it is right.

Behind all this is the Africa of Botswana, where there is a correct way to shake hands or receive a gift. Where there is generosity and consideration and a sharing of income to make the economy work. Precious Ramotswe recognises the world is changing – not always for the best – as she keeps assuring us that "this is not Nigeria!"

The final page says it all. When the American woman asks why the giraffe give its tears, she is told. " I suppose we can all give something. A giraffe has nothing else to give – only tears."

And Precious sees a giraffe with its strange stilt borne body and its moist velvet cheeks and liquid eyes and thinks of all the beauty there was in Africa and of the laughter and the love. And hopes it's true.

Toys and gifts are required for all ages including cuddly toys, painting and drawing sets including felt tip pens etc.


Seasonal Gifts for Elderly Folk: in addition so smellies writing sets, purses/wallets. scarves and socks
